Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2025. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

The company does not trade for profit and is prohibited from making distributions to its members.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

We aim to improve the quality of life of socially excluded children (aged 8+), young people and adults with learning disabilities throughout the Scottish Borders. Our volunteer befriending projects overcome social barriers and provide fun and accessible opportunities, experiences and friendship networks on a long term basis. They develop the qualities and skills needed for independent living, volunteering and employment and give regular high quality respite to family carers.

Our peer-age befriending for all ages is a very direct and effective route to improving social inclusion and our service is unique in the UK for its variety. We have 315 members of whom 265 are currently supported by 200 peer-age volunteers in 41 befriending groups and 45 traditional 1:1 links. Groups meet in community venues, in-school and on Zoom, and activities are similar to mainstream groups, including arts & crafts, drama, life skills, journalism, gardening, music, cookery, keep fit, games and overnight trips. 305 family carers benefit from regular respite.

We were originally founded by Berwickshire family carers in 1990 and now deliver through four branches (Berwickshire, Central Borders, Roxburgh and Tweeddale) each with its own experienced staff and local committee of stakeholders. They work with local schools, Borders College, Social Work and care providers to reach as many people as possible.

The need for the service

Our members have a lifelong condition that affects their development and means they need help to understand information, learn skills and live independently. Cerebral Palsy, Downs Syndrome & Autism are often involved, with high accompanying levels of epilepsy & sensory impairment.

They are socially excluded throughout their lives: Most are taught in additional needs units and lack opportunities for friendships and activities that are crucial to wellbeing and achieving their full potential: Only around 1% of people with learning disabilities have a partner in adult life and 5% a job. They are at risk if they go into the community on their own and there are almost no mainstream community activities they can access.

Family carers have a role which is difficult to sustain, isolating, reduces their opportunities, affects their wellbeing and makes them twice as likely to live in poverty.

The need for community involvement, friendships, and activities that are fun and enriching comes out loud and clear from the members and families we work with, and this is reflected in the feedback below.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Activities

In the 12 months to the end of March 2024 we grew significantly, supporting 265 members with learning disabilities, up from 245 the previous year. We have 335 places in 41 befriending groups (compared with 290 in 37 groups last year) and 3 new groups are planned for September 2025. 1:1 links have reduced from 55 to 45, continuing the gradual shift of focus towards groups. 102 members have both a 1:1 link and a group, or were in two groups. 305 family carers enjoyed short break respite. Around 200 volunteer befrienders have been involved during the year.

New groups included:

- A fitness group in Galashiels (Fruity Fitness)
- An Artful Numeracy group aiming to improve maths and money-handling.
- High and Primary school groups at Jedburgh Campus.
- A Drama group in partnership with Borders Youth Theatre
- A walking group (Woodland Warriors)

Highlights of the year included:

- Almost 200 people took part in our second Charmian Challenge fun run in April 2024. Held in memory of former director Charmian Ledsham, it was covered on ITV news.
- In May 2024 we ran two overnight trips: a youth trip to Harry Potter World near London (see <u>video</u> & <u>photoreport</u>) and an adult trip to Haggerston Castle (see <u>video</u> & <u>photoreport</u>). Both were joint trips between branches, ensuring new friends were made.
- The Jock McBond trailer and Lindarella radio play premiered in a Summer Revue in June 2024
- Friendship Day in October 2024
- Two pantomimes: <u>Countdown To Christmas</u> in December 2024 and Jungle Book in January 2025 (see <u>video</u> & photoreport).
- Our first mothers and daughters overnight trip, to Whitekirk in March 2025

A massive vote of thanks goes to all our amazing volunteers and <u>our funders over the last year</u>: our work would not be possible without their fantastic support.

Impact & Evaluation

We surveyed supported members, family carers and volunteers in June 2025, using accessible questionnaires deployed face-to-face, by telephone or online. The results are shown in our 2025 Impact Report and in summary were:

- Reported by members: more friends (97%) & opportunities (98%) and improved happiness/mental wellbeing (100%), confidence (99%), self-esteem (100%) and social skills (94%)
- Benefits to their carers: greater wellbeing (100%), more opportunities (89%) and a more sustainable caring role (97%).
- Volunteers: 93% said they had become more confident socialising with people with learning disabilities and more aware of the barriers they face. 98% said volunteering had met their hopes and expectations.

We also surveyed Care & Social Work Professionals, all of whom said we filled a gap in existing provision and delivered a safe and professional service.

Voluntary help and gifts in kind

The directors are very grateful for the continued support given by unpaid volunteers. It is estimated that around 16,150 hours of volunteer time were given. At the UK average wage of £20.17 per hour, this values volunteer time at £325,769 This does not include the added value of the befriending relationship: a study of befriending by Deloittes showed a Social Return on Investment of £6 for every £1 spent.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

For the befriending service in 2024-25, Interest Link Borders received total funding of £392,840 (2024: £417,027) as detailed at note 15 on page 17 of these accounts. General funding of £56,577 (2024: £44,045) was raised from service agreements, voluntary donations, local fundraising, sponsorship, bank interest and miscellaneous sources.

The accounts show net outgoing resource for the year, per page 7, of £15,607 (2024: incoming £32,068) which, when added to total funds brought forward at 31st March 2024, gives total funds of £282,271 as at 31st March 2025, comprising £168,078 on the General Fund and £114,193 on the Restricted Fund, details of which are included at note 14 on page 15 of these accounts.

Reserves policy

The charity recognises the need to have reserves to meet commitments in the event of income sources being lost or its activities terminated.

The charity has a policy of retaining unrestricted reserves that are adequate to:

- i) Sustain the charity for a period of 3 months if all other funding sources are terminated.
- ii) Pay any costs incurred if the charity were to cease operating.

The charity will take reasonable steps to ensure this level of reserves is achieved and maintained but its ability to do so will inevitably be limited by the sources of unrestricted funding available to it.

General reserves have increased this year to £168,078 (2024: £150,409) and the charity will make best efforts to continue strengthening these reserves over the coming years.

FUTURE PLANS

In 2024-25 we will continue to develop our service, including a new fitness group in galashiels and new overnight trips and arts production.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its Memorandum and Articles of Association and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Organisational structure

The structure of Interest Link Borders consists of:

- (a) the MEMBERS who have the right to attend the Annual General Meeting (and any Extraordinary General Meeting) and have important powers under the Articles of Association and the Companies Acts; in particular, the members elect people to serve as Trustees and take decisions in relation to changes to the Articles themselves;
- (b) the TRUSTEES who hold regular meetings during the year between Annual General Meetings, and generally control and supervise the activities of Interest Link Borders; in particular, the Trustees are responsible for monitoring the financial position of Interest Link Borders.

The members of Interest Link Borders shall consist of the subscribers to the Memorandum of Association and such other persons as are admitted to membership under articles 3 to 7 of the Articles of Association.

There are four Branch sub-committees (Berwickshire, Buddies Central Borders, Roxburgh, and Tweeddale) which meet bi-monthly and advise and assist the four Branch Co-ordinators.

The principal activity of the company during the year under review was to relieve the suffering and distress and promote the welfare of children, young people and adults with learning disabilities and their carers by the provision of befriending services.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Interest Link Borders

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

These notes deal with costs not allocated entirely to a single head.

Costs of generating funds

Costs of generating funds includes 25% of the Project Co-ordinator's and Administrator's salary, office costs, reflecting the time spent by them in fundraising activities during the year.

Activities in furtherance of Charities objectives

Costs of activities in furtherance of objects of the charity includes all branch and overheads costs includes 70% of the Project Co-ordinator's and Administrator's salary, office and travel costs, reflecting the time spent by them on delivering the service.

Governance Costs

Governance costs include 5% of the Project Co-ordinator's and Administrator's salary, reflecting the time spent in management and administration of the organisation.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
